



## OPTION CHOICES FOR PUPILS

As you can see from the 'dates for your diary' section we have planned a number of information evenings for parents and pupils in Years 9 and 11 to assist with the important task of course selection for Key Stage Four and the Sixth Form.

We have provided two main option lines for the sixth form, an advanced line (AS and A2) for those likely to attain at least 5 GCSEs at A\*-C and an intermediate line for those who want to increase their GCSEs and embark on BTEC vocational courses. For Year 10 2008-9 we are providing three learning pathways, one based on GCSEs, one based on GCSEs and vocational qualifications and one based on vocational qualifications and experience. We will do our very best to maintain the number of options for pupils and provide support and guidance for parents and pupils in the process of selecting the right course. Detailed booklets are available from school and the Year 9 and Sixth Form team are available to provide individual guidance.

## FAIRTRADE

The Penglais Fair Trade group ran a stall selling healthy Fair Trade snacks for a week last term in order to promote Fair Trade and raise money for Oxfam. The money raised was added to donations to the Fair Trade coffee stall during the year 8 parents' evening, making a total of £50. The group "bought a bog" by contributing to an Oxfam project which provides sanitation and toilet facilities to schools in developing countries or communities experiencing disasters such as earthquakes and tsunamis. The group would like to thank Waunfawr Co-op store and Alison Jones for donating food for the stall.

## DAWNS-TASTIG

Congratulations and very well done to Clarrissa and Rebecca!! If you have been following the programme on S4C you would have seen Clarrissa Busson, Year 9 and Rebecca Thomas, Year 10 being chosen as two of the eight finalists of Dawns-tastig shown on Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> December. They both went on to London with the other six finalists. This was viewed on New Year's Day. The prize was to have some dance lessons in the 'Pineapple Studios', London and then to take part in the end of term show in Stratford Circus. Both girls endured nine weeks, nine rounds of different styles of dance from ballet, Irish dance and even a hip hop video with a Welsh rapper! It was excellent viewing. Congratulations once again to you both – your hard work definitely paid off.

## BUDGET AND COUNTY LANGUAGE POLICY

In the next week the school will be receiving preliminary budget information for 2008-9. There has been coverage in the press about the difficulties the council is facing in balancing the budget this year. An increase in council tax has already been reported with £300,000 being earmarked for secondary school budgets. This allocation was absolutely essential to stave off disaster in the secondary sector. Whether it is enough will depend on the full allocation to be discussed this week. The overall situation is bleak not only this year but next year as well. We will do our best to maintain the school's curriculum, staffing, equipment, buildings and premises but it is likely to be extremely difficult. The scale of underfunding in the secondary sector since 2004 in Ceredigion is totalling over £1million. I shall keep you fully informed as plans are worked out in the next month.

The Cabinet has recently approved a new county language policy which will also be examined and discussed in the next few weeks. The governing body has already resourced improvements for provision for the increasing numbers of pupils following programmes of study in Welsh as a first language. This has been combined with measures to enhance the Welsh ethos of the school so that all pupils, regardless of linguistic background, will benefit. I will provide more information in the next newsletter.



## ENGLISH

**Duchess of Malfi** - Last year it was Leeds. This year, the search for a stage production of ‘The Duchess of Malfi’ for Year 13 took us to the Playhouse in Oxford to see what OUDS (The Oxford University Dramatic Society) would make of Webster’s Jacobean Revenge Tragedy. The day started chilly and bright, and the marathon coach journey was not an unpleasant one – although when we found ourselves heading north on the M5 towards Birmingham there was a moment’s trepidation – but we arrived amidst the dreaming spires with just enough time for a quick college sandwich before settling in amongst the other matinee watchers.

You always feel a slight concern when taking pupils to a non-professional production, but the Oxford students did not disappoint and it was interesting to see how they chose to interpret the characters. The setting was updated to somewhere in the twentieth century and there were some unusual stage devices used to convey the decadence and corruption of the Italian court. After the performance we had arranged a short talk with the director and our pupils asked him some probing questions about his Bosola (too much of a nice guy), about the scenes cut from the text (what happened to Forobosco?) and acting at university (where do you find the time?). The director (not much older than our students of course) seemed impressed by the depth of knowledge that informed the questions; our pupils were pleased to be allowed so close to the footlights and grease paint – ‘Look there’s Antonio!’ remarked one as a rather bashful undergraduate smiled and waved his way hurriedly out of the theatre.

There was a little time to savour the delights of academia before we were all back on the bus heading westwards via the Severn Bridge. As with the trip to Leeds last year, the consensus was that, whatever the minor shortcomings of the production, there is nothing like seeing a play in performance and we look forward to our next long day out.

**Poetry of Keats** – In October the English Department was delighted that Dr. Richard Marggraf Turley accepted an invitation to address Year 13 students about the poetry of John Keats. Dr. Marggraf Turley is a senior lecturer at Aberystwyth University in the Department of English. He is also Co-Director of the Centre for Romantic Studies. Year 13 found his presentation stimulating and thought-provoking and the ensuing discussion was diverse and challenging. We would like to thank him for sharing his ideas and giving of his time.

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## HEALTH AND SOCIAL CARE – Year 13 Students visit Pathology Laboratories at Bronglais Hospital.

Penglais students were privileged to have been given a tour and a talk by Caroline Longman, Manager Microbiology and Caroline Fitzpatrick, Manager Haematology.

The students are currently working on an assignment “Investigating diseases” part of which involves understanding how different diseases are diagnosed. At Bronglais the students were able to appreciate the dedication of the staff to not letting any diagnostic opportunity pass by. Ms. Longman showed how different bacterial cultures were identified from urine and stool samples and how their resistance to various antibiotics could be tested. Ms. Fitzpatrick, Haematology Laboratory Manager showed how blood was tested for irregularities, comparing normal samples with those containing parasites and excessive white cells as well as the essential job of establishing a patient’s blood type before a transfusion could take place.

On Sunday morning the pupils performed in the beautiful setting of Johanneskirche, Kronberg, after the brass band had done some busking up the medieval street. All the choirs, brass, wind and string ensembles helped raise the roof to a packed church. The pupils then finished their music duties by singing a range of carols at the Christmas market in Kronberg. As always each performance was well received by enthusiastic and appreciative audiences and it was a pleasure to share our Christmas music, both traditional and modern with our Kronberg friends. To relax before the long journey home the party enjoyed a game of 10 Pin Bowls, with Mr Evans posting the winning score. After an evening quiz, organised by the sixth formers, the party made their way home on Monday, arriving at 6.45 am Tuesday, with just a handful of pupils earning their stripes by making school for 9am. 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## PHYSICAL EDUCATION

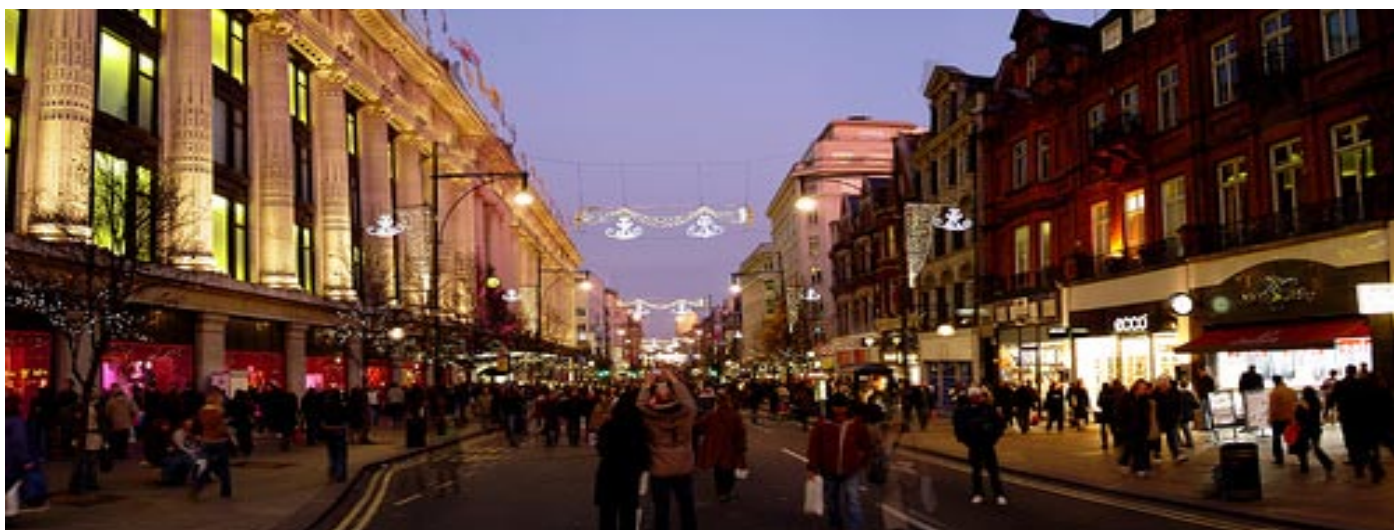
